



A New Center to Serve Exploited and At-Risk Youth

Atlanta's exploited, abused, and at-risk youth are fortunate to be living in a city that has so many individuals, community leaders, and organizations working to make a difference in their lives and put them on a positive path. Sadly, though, even with the best intentions and dedication, some of our most vulnerable and victimized youth are slipping through the cracks in getting the life-changing services they so desperately need. For example:

- * Fulton County Juvenile Court, the largest in the Southeast and located in the heart of Atlanta, dealt with 6,738 at-risk children and youth in 2014, with most cases involving Department of Family and Children Services (DFCS) youth between the ages of 12-16.
- * Over 1,100 youth have been identified as child sex trafficking victims in Georgia, with more discovered each year as identification protocols are improved and implemented.
- * New research by Georgia State University, Emory University, youthSpark, and others documents 3,374 homeless and runaway youth in greater Atlanta.
- * Eighty-two percent of LGBTQ youth had problems during the previous year with bullying about their sexual orientation, and 64% felt unsafe at school (Georgia Equality).

A variety of reasons contribute to what these youth face in connecting them to the services they need, including (1) the need to connect service providers together that, unfortunately, often work in isolation from one another, (2) the need for early intervention to play a bigger role in the system of care (instead of waiting for victimization to worsen), (3) the need to remove logistical barriers (i.e., making transportation available to youth who need to get to their service providers), and (4) the need to learn more about identifying and serving at-risk boys, especially in regard to child sex trafficking.

youthSpark's new *Youth Services Center*—housed within the Fulton County Juvenile Court, but owned and operated independently by youthSpark—will bridge many of the extreme gaps that still exist in Atlanta's capacity to connect exploited, abused, and at-risk youth with life-changing services. Youth will be connected, for example, to mental health/trauma counselors to meet their individual needs and also provided assistance to overcome barriers to accessing their treatment (e.g., insurance enrollment, transportation, etc.). Opportunities to enroll in non-traditional educational programs, like job training, GED classes, and assistance with testing fees, will also be offered to clients. With the help of volunteers, we will be able to provide other unique opportunities, including music lessons and art classes, to empower youth and cultivate their talents.

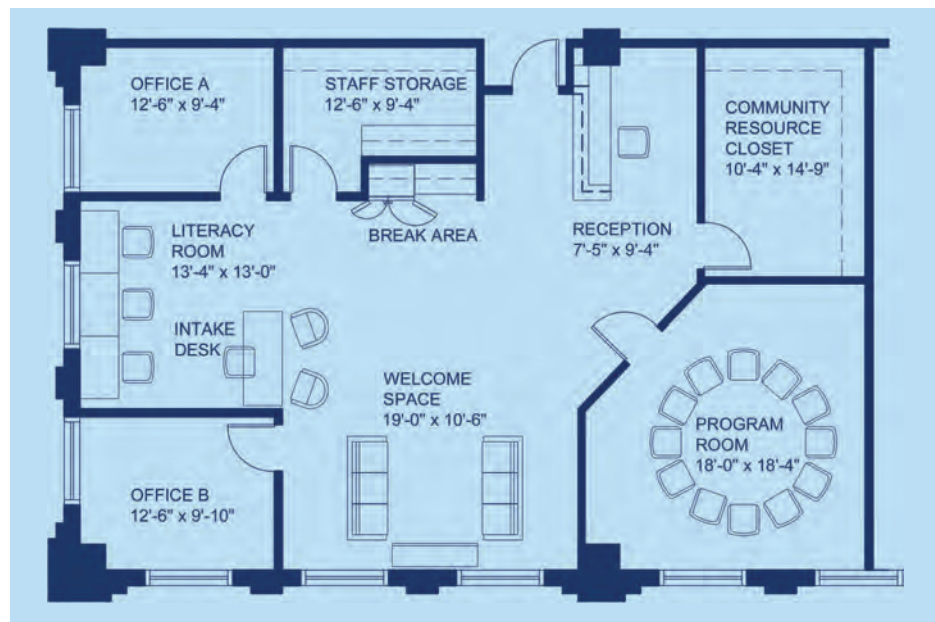
The overall objectives for the *Youth Services Center* include:

- * Screening for current and unresolved prior

exposure to abuse and exploitation

- * Providing case-managing advocates who mentor and oversee services for the Center's youth
- * Creating service referrals to trained, credentialed partners who are positioned to address individual and family vulnerabilities
- * Providing funding to cover gaps and shortfalls in connecting youth with needed services

As we move into the early summer, progress on our Center is moving along at an exciting pace. We have already begun work with experts to provide technical expertise in building key operational components of the Center; work with designers to help us create a comforting and visually stunning space; and have nearly completed work with Fulton County officials to finalize construction plans and permitting. The Center is scheduled to launch by fall 2016!

youthSpark Kicks Off Its “Building Brighter Futures” Capital Campaign

In the early fall of 2015, we kicked off the silent phase of our first-ever capital campaign, “Building Brighter Futures,” to support the creation of our new *Youth Services Center*. Since then, we have been thrilled to welcome some amazing partners and to share the excellent news on the progress our campaign. As of May 2016, we have raised over \$600,000 of our \$700,000 campaign goal!

The “Building Brighter Futures” goal of \$700,000 will help support start-up costs to create the Center, in addition to operating funds for a portion of the first three years.

- Year 1 Start-up and Operations: Raise the initial start-up expenses of \$100,000, plus \$300,000 of the initial operating budget (\$400,000 total)
- Year 2 Operations: Raise two-thirds of the second year’s operating budget (\$200,000 total)
- Year 3 Operations: Raise one-third of the third year’s operating budget (\$100,000 total)

How Every Teen Can Help Change the World

An organization that has “youth” in its name wouldn’t be doing its job if it didn’t engage young people beyond those receiving help. youthSpark has been committed to training the leaders of the future through our Teen Ambassador Training program, where youth are taught the realities of trafficking from both the supply and demand sides, how to keep themselves and others safe (with an emphasis on cyber safety), and how to get involved and become an advocate.



We believe that every teen can help change the world and make a difference for those in need.

We are grateful to work with several youth-run groups, including the Atlanta International School Against Human Trafficking (AISAHT) student group, and North Atlanta High School’s videography student group. Students involved in AISAHT conducted special fundraiser events for youthSpark and sponsored assemblies for fellow students to learn about this important issue. Students from North Atlanta High School worked with Reimagine Atlanta to create an innovative PSA video. In 2016, the youth, working with experts from youthSpark, decided to raise awareness about the lesser known aspects of human trafficking: the male victims and the buyers. Leslie was referred to youthSpark because she was in a relationship with a twenty-something-year-old male. Like most girls entering our program, she really believed this man was her boyfriend and that he loved her. Unfortunately, she didn't have very many positive examples of healthy relationships as her mother, too, experienced sexual exploitation as a young girl. Leslie started attending weekly group sessions and learned how to keep herself safe and also how to focus on her future. She'd always wanted to be on the dance team at her school, but her mom could never afford the fees and her grades would not allow her to even try out. We were able to cover all fees for her to try out if she worked to improve her grades and attendance. She felt honored and inspired to work hard. She accomplished her goal and made it on the team on the first try! She has continued to soar and we continue to encourage her success. As a peer leader, she motivates new girls to get active and follow their dreams.
